


WE ALL LIVE IN A WATERSHED!

NONPOINT SOURCE POLLUTION

Greatest threat to our waterways

- ◇ Yard debris
- ◇ Trash/liter
- ◇ Pet waste
- ◇ Construction debris
- ◇ Cooking grease
- ◇ Motor oil
- ◇ Paints and solvents
- ◇ And much more

Don't blow grass and leaves into the street and storm drains. Compost or mulch yard waste to be used in gardening and landscaping.

Litter not only contributes to water pollution, it clogs channels, causing flooding. Place trash in bags and store in a trash can with a secure lid.

Recycling used household items like newspapers, plastic bottles, and aluminum cans significantly reduces the level of pollutants in our storm drain system.

Improper disposal of cooking oil can cause problems in the sewer systems. Pour used oil into an old milk carton or other non-recyclable container and dispose of it in the garbage.

Pet waste left on the ground or thrown into the storm drain can be a major source of bacteria in our local waters. Pick up pet waste. Flush it in the toilet or bag it and throw it in the trash.

When more fertilizer than needed is used, the excess amounts are washed into the storm drain and into the rivers. Avoid fertilizing before a heavy rain and only apply what is needed.

Automotive fluids poured into the storm drain kills aquatic plant and animal life. Repair leaks. Dispose of oils and parts at recycle centers.

Prevent detergents and other chemicals from entering storm drains; wash your car on your lawn or use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles wastewater.
